



Refuse and Recycling Information

- Refuse is collected on the same day every week
- Recyclable items are picked up every other week
- Residents may place a maximum of two bulk items each week at curbside
- Bulk items do not need to be bagged
- Place all reuse (other than maximum of 2 bulk items) in plastic bags and place at designated site on collection day
- Place at curb no earlier than 7 p.m. on the night before collection and no later than 6 a.m. on the day of collection
- Animal feces and litter: place in double plastic bags and place outside the refuse container
- Needles, syringes and lancets: place in medical waste containers
- Other sharp objects: wrap in heavy paper and place in a box reinforced with tape or string
- Prohibited materials: propane tanks, smoke detectors, and chemicals
